Astelia grandis		Astelia grandis is an imposing species similar to A.fragrans. It has wide olive green leaves with a silvery sheen beneath and reddish purple midribs. Brachyglottis lagopus	A variable species. Both forms prefer a moist humus-rich and slightly gritty soil. The larger leaved requires shade, the smaller leaved variety is more robust. Brachyglottis Leonard Cockayne	A large spreading shrub, 2.5m wide and up to 3 m high. It produces yellow flowers during December to January on panicles. Brachyglottis Otari Cloud	The velvet-covered, grey-blue leaves held densely on short branches that are also felted. The foliage is adorned with masses of showy, yellow flowers in spring. It typically grows to 75 cm tall and 1 m wide and responds well to trimming which encourages new growth. Best results when grown in full sun or partial shade on a well drained site. Brachyglottis repanda	A shrub or small tree up-to 6m. Small creamy, fragrant flowers from August - November. It is a little frost sensitive. Brachyglottis rotundifolia	A wonderful plant that is found in coastal areas of Stewart Island. It is frost hardy and does best in well drained sites that do not dry out too much. Bulbinella angustifolia		A common species with narrow green to brownish green leaves 40 -50cm tall but can get up to 1m with yellow flowers November to December. Happiest in a sunny position but will tolerate shade. Will grow in dry or wet soil. Great for a rock garden or in a border.	<b>1L</b>	\$13.50
Calystegia soldanella		Creeping plant found in sandy coastal areas or lake shores. A perennial but in colder climes dies back over winter. Flowers are a mauve trumpet shape with a white stripe.	<b>PB3</b>	\$13.50
Carex albula		A tufted sedge 45cm tall. It has a pale buff to white colouring. Quite attractive plant great for areas where you want a contrasting colour or upright grass. Tolerant of cold and dry conditions. Found in the Mackenzie Country and near Kurow in North Otago.	<b>OP</b>	\$7.00
Carex banksiana		Densely tuft grass growing to 35cm. Found in coastal forest and shrub.	<b>OP</b>	\$7.00
Carex buchananii		A densely tufted plant growing to 60cm with a very distinctive reddish brown colour. It prefers a slightly damp spot in semi-shade for good colour all year round. Will tolerate heavy frost, full sun, dry or exposed sites also.	<b>OP</b>	\$7.00
Carex comans		A very hardy plant that thrives anywhere. The leaves range from a greyish brown to a reddish yellow-green. It grows to 40cm high and is found in damp, poorly drained soils in tussock grasslands.	<b>OP</b>	\$7.00

Carex geminata	LCP BP	Can grow from 50cm to 1.3m high. Attractive flower spikes November to February. Hardy to frost and tolerant of wind. Carex lambertiana	LCP	Carex lambertiana ia a sedge found in forests, scrub and swamps. The ribbed leaves are bright green, and overall it is very similar to C.dissita but it is a stronger plant growing up to 1m. Carex littorosa	LCP	A plant growing to 60cm tall that is found in marshes or sandy tidal river banks. It is quite erect and the leaves are pale green to red. Good for frosty, exposed and moist sites.	<b>OP</b>	\$7.00
Carex maorica	LCP	A good plant for environmental plantings as it has become quite uncommon. It grows to 50cm tall and is often found in water on margins of swampy lakes, swamps and other damp areas. It will tolerate quite dry sites and heavy frost. It is great for sun or shade.	<b>OP</b>	\$7.00
Carex rubra		Hook Grass. A red grass with very dark narrow leaves reaching 35cm tall. Best foliage colour is obtained in a sunny well drained spot, although this sedge will also cope with semi shaded positions provided they are well drained. Carex solandri	LCP	A plant that prefers moist sites in semi-shade to full shade. It grows up-to 50cm high. It is a forest plant so it is good for under-planting trees in damper areas. Will tolerate heavy frost, full sun to shade, moist sites and wind exposure.	OP	\$7.00
Carex tenuiculmis		This species is found in the South Island, Stewart Island and the Chatham Islands in a range of habitats. It is slightly smaller than C.secta and has leaves only 2mm wide with a reddish bronze colour. It grows in the same conditions as C.secta but does not form a trunk.	PB3	\$17.50
Carex testacea		A most sort after sedge. It is a densely tufted plant growing from 40-60cm tall. It has light green foliage that has a coppery tone towards the top of the plant. It is best suited to a well drained sunny site and looks good in mass plantings. Frost hardy.	OP	\$7.00
Carex trifida		Deep brown flower spikes contrast well against blue-green foliage of this sedge that grows to 60cm, in bold clumps. Although best in shady, wet places alongside water it can grow quite well on a dry bank. It will grow in cold, shade as long as it is not got overhead shading.	PB5	\$17.50
Carex uncinata	BP	Robust, densely tufted species of sedge that grows to about 40 cm tall. Although depending on conditions, it may grow taller.	OP	\$7.00

Carmichaelia Muritai		This nationally endangered tree grows up to 5-6m tall. Flowers from December to January are white with purple/violet markings. Carpodetus serratus	<i>BP OX</i>	Marble leaf. Eventually up-to 12m tall. White star like flowers when mature. Flowers are produced in profusion during November-March and are fragrant. Celmisia bellidioides		Green cushion mountain daisy. A mat-forming sub alpine shrub 30-90cm across. Flowerheads 2cm across on 3-5cm stems. Naturally found in wet rocky and gravelly places in gorges and along streamsides.	<b>1L</b>	\$13.50

Chionochloa conspicua		Will make an excellent feature as it resembles a toetoe. It will thrive in a number of places, prefers to be sheltered from strong winds or coastal conditions. Chionochloa flavicans		Miniature Toe Toe. An excellent plant. Forms a lush green clump with toetoe like fronds during the summer. It grows to 1m tall and looks good as a single plant or a small hedge. It grows best in a slightly moist, sunny site but will tolerate light shade or dry sites when established. Chionochloa rigida		A hardy plant found in dry sites from the Rakaia and Hokitika catchment areas south and also on Banks Peninsula. It grows to 1m tall. It is hardy to frosts, exposed sites, and sunny sites.	<b>PB3</b>	\$17.50
Chionochloa rubra		Red Tussock. An excellent landscaping plant that suits dry or wet areas. It is very effective grown in groups or mass plantings. The damper the soil the redder the plant appears. It grows to 1.5m tall and is hardy to most sites including heavy frosts.	<b>PB3</b>	\$17.50

Clematis afoliata		A leafless scrambler with stems that grow up to 3m long and are stiff, wiry and grooved. These stems often form large bundles with an appearance like a large tangled wire or thick string. Yellow scented flowers from October to November.	<b>PB3</b>	\$25.00

Clematis Purity		A cultivar of C. fosterii and C. Paniculata bred for its hardiness in the garden. Stunning large creamy white sweetly scented flowers in Spring. Requires a cool root run.	<b>PB5</b>	\$25.00
Clematis quadribacteolata		One could describe this plant as quite ugly in appearance but when you smell the lovely scented purple brownish flowers you will want one in your garden. It is best described as a trailing or climbing plant to 2m. Keep the roots cool when planted.	<b>PB3</b>	\$25.00
Clianthus maximus		Kaka Beak. This differs from the standard Kaka Beak by having larger leaves and brighter red flowers. It grows to 2m and will handle full sun and quite dry conditions. Prefers semi shade.	<b>PB5</b>	\$17.50
